Students at all Penn State locations are invited to participate in the four-week, four-credit course offered in Trier, Germany by Behrend. The program, under the direction of Dr. Stephen DeHart, associate professor of German and humanities, is offered May 13-June 11 by the School of Humanities and Social Sciences at Penn State-Behrend. Deadline for application is February 13. Trier was founded in 16 B.C. during the rule of Emperor

Augustus, and many of the buildings from the Roman period still survive. Located in westernmost Germany, Trier is a short distance from Luxembourg, France, the Netherlands, and Belgium. It is located in the Moselle Valley, one of Germany's premier wine-producing regions. Named Europe's "Cultural City" in 1995, Trier attracts about 3.5 million tourists annually. In addition to travel, participants in the Trier program will be able to take one of the following Penn State for-credit courses: intermediate German, German conversation and composition, international business (graduate level), or independent study in Germany. During the Study Abroad program, classes will meet Monday through Thursday in local settings that will help participants absorb the German language quickly. This is the only German language Study Abroad program in the Penn State system appropriate for students enrolled in the normal twelve-credit language sequence. The trip is open to faculty, staff, and students from all colleges and universities as well as members of the community. This year's tour includes round-trip transportation, lodging in two and three person rooms, and side trips. 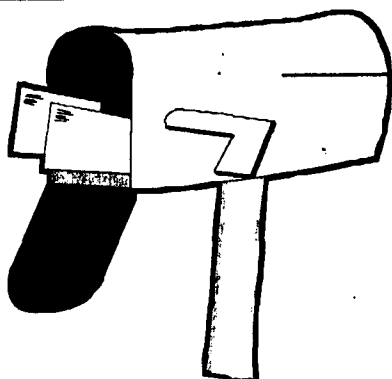

CAAIS

The Comprehensive Academic Advising and Information System (CAAIS) - HYPERLINK "http://caais.psu.edu" http://caais.psu.edu/ is a valuable electronic resource intended to supplement student/adviser relationships and engage students in interactive inquiry for informed educational planning. CAAIS consists of five components:

- Interactive Advising - provides students with expert-based academic advising, including tailored responses based on individual student input, student academic history and University policy.
- OASIS - Open Access to Student Information System provides students with access to their academic records. Student access ranges from viewing semester grades and transcript information, current course schedules to updating address information and requesting e-mail copies of degree audits.
- Academic and Advising References - provides hypertext links to those official University documents and publications critical to academic advising and to the internal operations of CAAIS.
- Adviser Services - provides advisers with a broad student information base and student specific information in support of adviser day-to-day interactions with students.
- CAAIS Index - provides a comprehensive list of the topics contained within CAAIS, and search engines for the CAAIS web pages. Its purpose is to provide a navigational aid for the users of CAAIS.

Students must have a current Access account provided by the Center for Academic Computing to gain access to the Interactive and OASIS components. To learn more about CAAIS and to use its many services, access the CAAIS Home Page on the World Wide Web.
