THE LOGANWINTERGARDEN SERIES: THE CAVANI STRING QUARTET

Music at Noon: The Logan Wintergarden Series continues its tenth anniversary season with a performance by the Cavani String Quartet on Thursday, Oct. 14th, at Behrend College. Audiences are invited to bring a brown-bag lunch to this noontime event, which is free and open to the public.

The Cavani String Quartet was the very first group to play for Music at Noon, which was founded by Kay Logan in 1989 and is supported by the Harry A. Logan Jr. Foundation. Logan created this unique series as a way of bringing classical music to all audiences, including children. Many of the musical groups incorporate an educational program with audience inter-

action into their performances. Writing about the ensemble, The Washington Post states, "The Cavani String Quartet succeeds like few others in communicating the fun of music-making and the sheer joy of balancing timbres and weaving sound." The group received the prestigious Naumberg Chamber Music Award in 1989 and the ASCAP-Chamber Music America Award for Adventurous Programming of Contemporary Music in 1998. Violinists Mari Sato and Annie Fullard, cellist Merry Peckham, and violist Kirsten Docter are deeply committed to the teaching of chamber music and have developed a series of educational and outreach programs for a wide variety of settings and for audiences of all ages. In addition to their current residency at the Cleveland Institute of Music, the ensemble has performed mini-residencies at colleges, universities, and in communities throughout the United States.

FILM SERIES PULLS INTO CENTRAL STATION AT BEHREND

The International Film Series at Behrend continues with Central Station, to be shown at 7 p.m. on Monday, October 18th, in the Reed Union Building Lecture Hall.

In this moving film, Director Walter Salles gives the audience a taste of life on the road in Brazil and the lives of a bitter, middle-aged ex-schoolteacher and an orphaned young boy. The teacher, Dora, who works at Central Station, writes letters for the illiterate masses from her stand, but rarely sends them out. One day, she comes across a letter that she wrote on behalf of a woman with a little boy in search of his father. When the woman is suddenly struck by a car and killed, the boy turns to

the only possible link he has to home: Dora.

The two begin their journey through life together. The boy is a stubborn and resilient brat hero who pushes Dora into being his protector and guide, while she drinks and complains, and gradually warms to the role. Salles strives to convince the audience that when you believe you're alone in the world, you never know where you'll find home, or for that matter, family.
