Where did these amazing deals come from? No, not the world's greatest travel agency or a retained in the artine industry. You can get these astonishing airfare sails online in a matter of minutes. All around the world, travelers are using the World Wide Web to book airfares; hotel reservations, and car remain in rapidly increasing numbers, saving tous of money in the bers, saving tons of money in the

In 1998, Americans spent \$2.1 billion on buline travel purchases alone, and it is expected that that figure will grow to \$12 billion by 2002, \$7 billion of which is spent on airline tickets, according to Internet research firm Jupiter Com-munications. Why are these figures so high? The key is savings. People are finding out that tickets sequired online are frequently sheaper than anything they can get from travel agencies, or even by calling the airlines themselves.

There are numerous ways to find chean airfares online, from fullservice travel websites to airline homepages to online auctions. The consensus is to shop all of them. By taking the time to look at all of them, you will definitely find the lowest fare and the method that works best for you.

The first method is full-service

sites--all purpose, virtual travel agencles that cover everything you could ever want from hotels to car rentals to specialized vacation packages. And there are plenty of them to choose from. The three most popular

are MSNExpedia (WWW.EXPEDIA.COM) Travelocity (WWW. TRAVEL-OCITY.COM), and Preview Travel (WWW.PREVIEWTRAVEL.COM). These sites access the same major computer reservation systems that the airlines and travel agents use, which makes them a great place to get an idea. on prices. Most let you create a user profile where you can securely store. your credit card number, seating and meal preferences, and frequent flier numbers so that every time you want. to order tickets they are readily available. And some will even email you with fare alerts on special deals to the locations you select in your profile. Jupiter Communications suggests that you check out as many full-service

Another method is the actual airline websites. Most are now offering secure bookings directly through the website. Internet bookings save the airlines money because the travel agents' commissions are eliminated, and this works out well for you. The savings that the airlines receive are passed on to you through special discounts on online purchases.

sites as you can before settling on one.

Many airlines also offer what they call "cyberdeals," where tickets are obtainable for last-minute purchase and travel at tremendous savings. You can only get these deals from the air-

lines' websites, and they are usually not listed on major reservation databases, so you can't get them anywhere else. One drawback is that you must be able to travel on short

You can also check out discount and auction websites. They are the latest addition into the online ticketing game. While offering some of the best deals, they come with limited options and the least amount of

At a discount site such as WWW.PRICELINE.COM, you designate what days you want to fly and how much you want to pay for a round trip ticket, and Priceline tries to find an airline from the 18 that it works with that will take your offer.

With an auction site such as WWW.IRAVECLEARINGHOUSECOM. you bid for tickets between particular destinations within a restricted time frame. The deals can be hit-ormiss, and you do need to read the fine print carefully. Ticket prices very seldom include taxes and mailing fees, and you usually cannot earn frequent flier miles with these tickets. Regardless, these sites are still a feasible option, and you just might find a deal too good to pass up.

Whether you are traveling to Pittsburgh, Los Angeles, or even San Juan, shopping for airfare online just might be the way to go. If you are going home for the holidays, you can save money and time--2 things college students never seem to have enough of.

specific organization that represented international students, and he and fellow club founders "wanted to show the students of Behrend and the Erie community something that would broaden their cultural and international horizon[s]."




