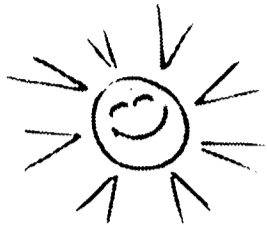


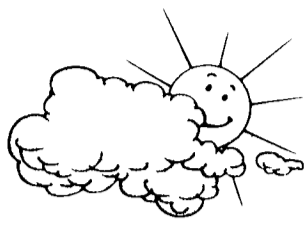

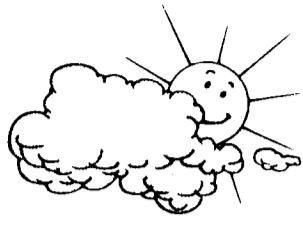

Telescopes featured at open house

Dr. Roger Knacke, professor of physics and astronomy, will present "The Great Telescopes" at the next Open House Night in Astronomy. This presentation will be held on Thursday, September 27, at 7:30 p.m. in Science 101.

Knacke will describe the large telescopes that have been built recently, as well as those being planned. The latest telescopes are hundreds of times more powerful than any other built in the last 50 years and can return remarkably clear photos of the universe.

Barnard expands his musical domain

Directing Behrend's choir, lecturing in music, and organizing the Music at Noon: Logan Wintergarden Series just wasn't enough for Dr. Daniel Barnard. He has now taken on the responsibility of conducting the Erie Philharmonic Chorus.

"I am extremely pleased about the position that I have been given. I have had one rehearsal so far and I am enjoying it," Barnard said. Rehearsals are two hours a week, but Barnard spends about half a day preparing for them.

Barnard can't remember a time when he didn't like music. When he was about 4 years old, his mother introduced him to the piano. He then not only began to play his assigned music lessons, but he also played his sisters' lessons.

Although Barnard treasured playing the piano, his interests in music have expanded. He also made singing and music composition a part of his life. Barnard went on to earn an undergraduate degree in voice performance and a master's and doctorate in music composition.

"I believe in what I am doing and I have a great appreciation for music," Barnard explained.

During his career, Barnard has been successful in several international competitions and has even received a commission from St. Paul's Cathedral Choir for this November. Currently, he is writing a piece for the Behrend Band for its upcoming tour in Paris.

this year, Barnard was appointed conductor of the Erie Philharmonic Chorus. In this capacity he leads 100-120 people, ranging in age from high school students to adults in their 30s and older. Honor students from local high schools are eligible to be in the Chorus, as well as anyone from the college level.

"Students are welcome, if they have a musical background, to come and try out for either the Behrend Choir or the Erie Philharmonic Choir," Barnard said.

This year, Barnard is trying something new with the Philharmonic. His idea is to recruit short-term members along with the long-term members the Philharmonic has always brought in. In doing so, Barnard believes he can tempt those who

are unsure of being a long-term member to instead sign up on a concert-by-concert basis, allowing them to sing when it works with their schedules.

The Erie Philharmonic Chorus practices every Tuesday night, September through May; however, they take the month of December off. Four performances by the Erie Philharmonic Orchestra and the Erie Philharmonic Chorus are conducted together each year. This year the performances will be on Oct. 20, Nov. 10, Dec. 1 (the Christmas show), and March 23. Two of the performances are pop and two are symphonic. All performances are at the Warner Theater in downtown Erie; student tickets cost \$8.
