

But later in the presentation after being asked by an audience member if the general public will be able to manage their accounts responsibly, Santorum said, "All I can suggest is that when you give people money they will take an interest."

Another question skeptics of partial privatization are asking is how a government already trillions of dollars in debt will take the blow of picking up the slack private accounts will create. Today's social security dollars are going to today's retirees. If 4 percent of the amount being paid into social security is taken away, the government will have to pick up the bill or decrease benefits; something Santorum says the government will not do.

"[Privatization] will only put us more in debt; debt that young people will pay back at even higher interest rates," said Mary Betcher, one of the protestors.

Protestors and several audience members also questioned the current system's taxation of only the first \$90,000 of income, a break the majority of Americans do not experience. But Santorum defended the system saying if the wealthy were taxed, "you get a little longer before the system starts getting less in than it pays out, but you don't solve the problem."

He also said social security tax "becomes a burden even for people who make \$100,000."

At the conclusion of the presentation, Santorum thanked the audience for being hospitable.

"In Philadelphia two people tried to attack me," said Santorum.






