The women will travel to Thiel on April 4 and Hilbert on April 5. Both games will be double-headers. Hilbert college is one of the newly


added conference teams, along with Medaille College and Mount Aloysius.


"Despite our record, our team is growing and really

## Track teams kick off outdoor season with Clarion Invitational

Men and women's track team competed in the Clarion Early other teams and came out with strong standings.

The women put forth a good showing under bad weather conditions. Coached by Dave was less than three seconds Cooper, one record was broken behind the Geneva College team. and many are on their way.

Starting things off was sophomore Becky Gonzalez in the 100 high hurdles with a time of 17.15 seconds. Gonzalez, now the record holder for Behrend, qualified for the ECAC postseason. Finishing in third place was freshman Erica Smith and sixth freshman Natalie Romano.

Smith helped out the team in the 400 IM hurdles with a time of 1:10.41; by finishing in second place. This wasn't the only event in which Smith put forth and excellent effort.

The 4 x 100 group consisted of junior Nicole Mineweaser, senior Marlena McNutt, Gonzalez and Smith finished in second

place with a time of 53.46. These ladies are showing a great deal of potential and are a vital contribution to the team this

As well as competing in the 4 Bird Invitational along with 10 x 400, Smith and Mineweaser teamed up with senior Claire Manelick and freshman Leisl Soergel to finish in second place with a time of 4:22.25. This time

Junior Staci Banaszek finished in second place in the women's high jump at 5-01.00. Banaszek also took sixth in the long jump where she sustained knee injury. Despite lots of pain, there doesn't appear to be any tissue dam-

"The temperature was very cold and there was a brisk wind that made conditions very difficult," said Cooper. "I was pleased with how our women handled the tough conditions and performed well. It was a good tune-up meet with lots of D-II competition which should help us adjust to the D-I and D-II competition we'll see for the rest

of the season".

With seeing the competition of the upcoming season, the track team now has a better idea of what needs to be improved on and is headed full speed ahead.

On the men's side of the invitational, the team placed first in three events, displaying a strong performance in such dreary conditions.

Brad Ruffo, sophomore, broke the school record in the 10,000 meter run. With a time of 33:28.34, this broke the Behrend record by twelve seconds. It wasn't a surprise to Cooper that he broke the record, "but that he broke the record, this early in the season and by a large 12 second margin."

"I felt good running that well of a time this early in the season and also under the cold conditions," said Ruffo.

Carlos Lopez and Kevin Shugars, freshmen, both had top ten performances in the 400 intermediate hurdles. Carlos broke the Behrend school record as a freshman in his first meet of the 2005 season and placed second. A time of 58.05 earned him the Behrend record very early in the season. Shugars placed fifth.

"When I came the coaches made me feel comfortable and worked very hard with me," said

Clarion proved to be a spot for ECAC qualification with Isiah Meek hurdling 15.34 in the 110 high hurdles and placing second. Isiah Meek holds the school record for the 110 high hurdles with a time of 14.76.

"I feel I can qualify in the 4x100 and the 4x400," said Meek. "This year we can have more ECAC qualifiers than ever before."

Dennis Scheuer placed fourth in the 110 high hurdles. In the 400 intermediate hurdles Lopez brought home fifth place.

The 800 was also a strong event for the lions. Mike Barlett, senior, won the event. Eric Diluzio, freshman, placed second. Harry Balwick, junior, took forth with Brett Pollack, freshman, placing in sixth.

# Baseball finds its swing

The baseball team opened up league play last weekend with a double-header against La Roche. After splitting the two games with the Red Hawks, the Behrend Lions start 1-1 in the conference, 6-7 overall.

The first game was tight through the bottom of the seventh inning. The blue and white were up 2-1 and then took advantage of an infield error to bump up the lead 4-1. After making a few of their own mistakes, the Behrend Lions maintained a 5-4 lead going into the bottom of the seventh where unfortunately La Roche hit a 2-out game winning hit, taking the win 6-5.

Junior Chris McCartney started in game one against La Roche and battled through 5 innings to hold the lead. He struck out four and walked only two but gave up six hits. In to relieve McCartney was senior Jason Shaffer, who was, later, tagged with the loss.

Junior Eddie George knocked out two hits and a run for the team. Also earning runs for the squad was junior Greg Samson, sophomore Tim Nebel and freshman Brent Sullivan.

Game two was dominated from start to finish by the blue and white. The combination of fierce pitching and powerful at bats was too much for La Roche and Behrend came up on top with a 12-2 win. The teams were only able to get in five innings before darkness shut them down.

"It was important that our guys stepped up and bounced back in game two," said Head Coach Paul Benim. "Losing game one the way we did was hard, but our team's resilience was great."

Junior pitcher Ray DeVaul controlled the mound for the blue and white. He fanned five, walked two and allowed only 2 runs over the five innings.

"DeVaul was overpowering at times," said Benim. "He pitched very well for us."

The Lions took advantage of every at bat during the game, with some big hits the team has been waiting to see. Junior Shane Elzer was four for four at the plate, including a three-run home run. Freshman Cody Thull was three for three.

Senior Vince Canzano had an all-around solid weekend at bat, hitting 6 for 8 with 3 runs. On the season, he leads the team in batting average at .417, hits with 17 and runs with 8. Canzano also has 8 RBIs.

"Offensively we have come along and are getting better," said Benim. "Our defense has been solid and we have improved that aspect since Florida."

On Saturday, Behrend will face its second conference foe of the season, Pitt-Greensburg. Greensburg is 2-0 in their first two games of the season, defeating Hilbert twice last weekend. Once again, the weather does not look good for Saturday's game, which has become a large factor in how much the team is actually getting to play.

"It is important to play well in the league games against Pitt-Greensburg this weekend," said Benim. "They are 2-0. And if we play well and put ourselves in a position to win two games, we will be 3-1 in the league and everyone can chase us for a while."

The blue and white will also face Case Western Reserve on Sunday at 1 p.m.
