Coach Joe Paterno under scrutiny by National Organization for Women

Just one week after Penn State defeated Florida State in what may be considered one of the most exciting Orange Bowls of all time, Joe Paterno is back in the news. Woman's rights advocates around the country are speaking out against Paterno and calling for his resignation due to remarks he made regarding the issue of sexual assault. This came after Paterno had made comments during an interview regarding A.J. Nicholson, Florida State star linebacker and a Butkus Award Semifinalist, Nicholson was sent home before the Bowl game on Tuesday, Jan. 3 by Coach Bobby Bowden on accusations of sexual assault charges.

The interview took place the day before the Orange Bowl. This was just one of many incidents that the linebacker has piled up in his history. Nicholson is currently on six months probation for receiving a DUI. He was also arrested and charged with a misdemeanor for resisting arrest without violence after hiding from police in bushes near an off campus apartment complex which was under construction. He has not been charged with sexual assault; however the case is still up in the air.

When asked about the accusations against Nicholson, Paterno stated, "There are so many people gravitating to these kids. He may not have

even known what he was getting into." The president of the NOW (National Organization for Women) organization in Pennsylvania, Joanne Tosti-Vasey, stated that the comments "represent an institutional insensitivity that endangers

women," and that the remarks "send a message that this behavior is not serious...that sexual assault or rape or violence against women is acceptable for an athlete." Tosti-Vasey issued a news release for Joe Paterno to step down from

his coaching position and also to apologize for his comments. The statement reads, "Allegations of sexual assault should never be taken lightly," and, "Making light of sexual assault sends the message that rape is something to be expected and accepted." A spokeswoman from the NOW organization headquarters in Washington stated that president of NOW, Kim Gandy, supports Tosti-Vasey's call for Paterno's resignation.

Guido D'Elia, the communications director for Penn State Football, stated that Paterno "did not intend to make light of the assault allegations." Paterno may have made his comments toward the issue in the context of it being an added distraction to the bowl game environment. D'elia also added, "If you heard his tone, he really thought it was too bad for everybody. He was concerned for everybody." Penn State spokesman Bill Mahon also made similar comments on Paterno's behalf, stating that Paterno's words during the press conference were "taken out of context."

"When someone of his stature makes light of sexual assault, we have a serious problem," Tosti-Vasey said.

This is not the first time the NOW Organization has spoken against the Penn State University Athletic Department. In 2003, Penn State Cornerback Anwar Phillips was accused of sexual assault and participated in the Capital One Bowl. The bowl game took place three weeks after Phillips had accepted a two-semester expulsion from the university.
