Baseball team makes an impressive start

The Penn State Behrend baseball team opened their season winning an impressive eight out of their first nine games. The Lions, who traveled to Port St. Lucie, Florida, over spring break, earned a hard fought 7-5 victory over nationally ranked St. Scholastica. The win against the nationally-ranked Saints was followed by victories over Mount St. Vincent, Cazenovia, Manhattanville, Kenyon, and Western Connecticut State. In their eight victories the Lions outscored their opponents 81-33. Behrend's only loss of the trip came on the front end of a doubleheader against Western Connecticut State. The Colonials defeated Behrend 4-1.

Senior second baseman Mike Stetz led the Lions through their trip to Florida and batted an impressive .447 with 10 RBIs and was a flawless 5-for-5 on stolen base attempts. Ryan Smith led Behrend on the mound. Smith, who was named the AMCC Baseball Pitcher for the week of March 19, highlighted an impressive spring trip with two saves and one win, while not allowing any runs throughout the week. Smith ended last season with a record of 4-4 and an ERA of 2.98 and was second in the AMCC in saves with CONTRIBUTED PHOTO six and in appearances with 23. The Lions will rely on Smith to lead what looks to be a strong, albeit young,


senior, primarily consist of six sophomores and five
