
Miley Cyrus to change her name to... Miley Cyrus



Idol once again dominating TV of all genres

Two shows in one week double viewers of any other show

All genres of TV, from news to entertainment, has lately been bowing down to the ratings deity that is American Idol. After consistently owning the top spot of the ratings over its years of production, Idol is still in the number one slot.

From March 10 through 16, the popular talent search show held the top two spots. Its Tuesday show, which featured Beatles music, had just under 30 million viewers. The next show, on Wednesday, rolled in with over 27 million viewers. The third spot on the Nielson Media research viewership numbers was Survivor: Micronesia, at 13.2 million viewers, less than half of Idol's less successful Wednesday show.

formance in Wednesday's show latest criticism at Kristy Lee elicited a largely negative response from many reviewers.

"One doesn't need experience in nuclear energy to know a meltdown when one sees it," says point-spreads.com, a site which tracks odds for who will win. "And indeed, David Archuleta's performance of the Beatles' classic We Can Work It Out was a melt-down.

Archuleta, previously thought to be the obvious front-runner in the race, now faces his opposition as they narrow his lead.

Fox, the network which produces the show, is likely happy to see him slow his momentum, as the show will once again be able to excite fans with a memorable run to the finale. Other shows will have to sit on their hands as they will continue to get slammed by *Idol* in the ratings.

Popular TV show faces doubts on post-writer strike 2008 return

Last year, fans of Friday Night Lights were left with a suspenseful preparation for the Dillon Tigers' playoff run.

When the Writers Guild of America went on strike last year, the show had to put on hold the final seven of 22 shows which it had scheduled to air in the viewing season.

However, according to an article on Nikki Finke's Deadline Hollywood, the show is set to take the field for a third season. NBC, in coordination with DirecTV, will be airing FNL in the fall. "It's an innovative deal where NBC found a partner who will share costs and exhibition windows," reads the article.

When news broke that the football based show may be one show with its head on the chopping block for the changing schedule in fall, viewers responded in outrage. Faithfuls of the show created a website dedicated to saving the show and mass mailed NBC's Ben Silverman with support to continue the show in fall. They also mailed hundreds of miniature plasic footballs to NBC's execu-

The show was based around a Texas town where high school football is the main event. If the show is continued, it will be its third season. Filming will begin as early as July.

the show because despite positive reviews, it flopped in ratings and never generated as much of an audience as shows such as


One possibility that appeared earlier this year, says TV Squad.

an entertainment website, was the possibility of a dual broadcast. The idea was that the show would be broadcasted on NBC, its owner station, and re-broadcasted on another network, such as CW or TNT. The same thing happened for NBC's Heroes, which broadcasted both on NBC and Sci-Fi in its opening season.

However, with the advent of the DirecTV deal, such a dual broadcast idea is extremely unlikely to happen. Some viewers are worried as to whether they will be able to view the show.

One comment on Deadline Hollywood's article worries about the deal. "Will FNL be exclusive content of DirecTV under this deal? I would hate to lose it because I have TimeWarner."

"I can't say whether the fans' campaign to save the show by sending all those mini-footballs to NBC bigwigs worked the magic," says Finke. "But I do know the execs got them."



Documentary features an Iraqi heavy metal band
