Super Bowl showdown a surprise for most

Put a "free beer" sign in a bar window and watch the college students come crashing through the door. Put a ball in Tom Brady's hands and watch the Giants come crashing through the Patriots offensive line. At least that's what they did on Sunday. Feb. 3 as they battled their way to Super Bowl XLII

The buzz is still floating about how the New York Giants put an end to the New England Patriots' undefeated season when they upest the favored Pats 17-14. And the buzz will most likely contine for years to come as the game went down as one of the biggest upsets in Super Bowl history.

The 1972 Miami Dolphins can continue celebrating for another year as they go on to be the only team to have an undefeated season in NFL history with a record of 17-0.

The Giants had their game strategy down pat

from the start of the game. all the way through the final seconds of Super Bowl XLII. By winning the coin toss and choosing to start the game with their offense, they were able to keep Patriots QB Tom Brady off the field for almost the first 10 full minutes of the game. The opening drive lasted 9:59. the longest in Super Bowl history, resulting in a total of 63 yards and a 32-yard field goal putting the Giants up by three.

The Giants held the 3-0 lead until the end of the first quarter. The first play of the second quarter RB Laurence Maroney took

to put the Pats up 7-3. Not much more would happen offensively for either team for the rest of the first half as well as through the third quarter. The Giants defense held Brady and his no. 1 offense to just seven points in three quarters. The Giants sacked Brady four times and hit him at least 15 other times.

Despite the sacks and high pressure. Brady still connected with his receivers 29 of the 48 attempts for a total of 266 yards and one TD pass. It looked like the Patriots were going to pull off

the ball into the end zone another come-from-behind victory when with 2:42 left on the clock Brady connected with Randy Moss to take the lead 14-10.

Then, the highly unlikely occurred. MVP Eli Manning took his team down the field in 12 plays for a total of 83-yards and a game winning 13-yard TD pass to Plaxico Burress. Manning went 19 of 34 for 255 yards and 2 TD passes. After dodging what most thought was surely going to be a sack to end the game Manning completed a 32-yard pass into the fingertips of David Tyree for the first down. After a sack and an incomplete pass Manning connected with rookie Steve Smith for a 13-yard gain. Smith ran out of bounds to stop the clock. The next play sealed the deal when Manning hit Burress for the touchdown and the Giants went on to become America's favorite football team; at least until next

Do not fret sports fans; the football season isn't over yet. On Sunday, Feb. 10, the NFC will take on the AFC in the NFL Pro Bowl, which is happening in Honolulu, Hawaii at Aloha Staduim.

Behrend misses nationals, CHE playoff bound

The Penn State Behrend Ice Hockey Team failed to qualify for the American Collegiate Hockey Association (ACHA) National Championship, after going 1-1 in the ACHA Atlantic Regional that was

held in Warwick, Pa Behrend needed to go 2-0 to gain a spot in championship series, but were eliminated from contention after a 7-3 loss to Farmingdale State on Saturday, Feb. 16.

After a 2-1 lead late in the first period, Behrend let their guard down by giving up the next five goals to Farmingdale State. Behrend would counter with a third-period goal by sophomore Chris Simanic, but it would be too little too late for Behrend. Simanic finished with two goals and one assist in the losing effort. Freshman Nick Winarski grabbed a

goal and two assists Behrend Hockey looks for first CHE title and senior DJ Craven added three assists. Sophomore netminder Eric Thiessen was peppered throughout the game, finishing with 43 saves.

The loss left a bitter taste in the mouths of the players, but they believe that advancing that far into regionals is something to build off of. "For a program that has only been around for six years and to

be one game away from going to nationals is awesome. I am just glad I could have been apart of it and I'm looking forward to this weekend," says senior Dan Thiessen.

In their first matchup at regionals, Behrend played division rival Robert Morris in a grudge match from the week before. On Feb. 10, Behrend was upset by Robert Morris 5-1, setting up an interesting first round matchup with the two at regionals.

Trailing 3-1 after one period, Behrend came back, scoring six unanswered goals to a 7-3 victory. Leading the way for Behrend was Craven, who finished with four goals and two assist. Freshman Josh Horvath chipped in with two goals and two assist and Simanic added four assists for Behrend. Junior Justin Duchini scored the other goal for Behrend. E. Thiessen finished with 25 saves in the
