"I think the main purpose was to energize students for the Republican Party and if they let two hundred strong activists in a small, intimate setting they'll agree to work harder."

There is no clear reason as to why the campaign would hold a non-publicized, collegiate setting event for a mere group of 200 supporters, who were already likely to cast a vote for the McCain – Palin ticket. The fact that many students were completely oblivious to her visit doesn't help either. While the people in attendance largely enjoyed the visit, a larger group of people seemed almost angered at the secrecy of it.
