UGANDA--At least two people have been killed in Uganda's capital, Kampala, in clashes between police and rioting supporters of a traditional king. Police fired tear gas at the protesters who hurled stones and burned tires. The demonstrators protested against the government's attempts to stop the king of Buganda from visiting a region near Kampala where violence was feared.

2. Nigeria begins vast river dredge

NIGERIA--Nigeria has started a vast operation to dredge the Niger River to enable boats to carry goods from the Atlantic Ocean to remote villages in the interior. The government says it will bring communities together and secure the flow to hydro-electric plants.

MOSCOW--Foreign Minister Sergey V. Lavrov on Thursday all but ruled out imposing new sanctions against Iran over its nuclear program, brushing aside growing Western concerns that Iran had made significant progress in a bid for nuclear weapons.

Mr. Lavrov said he believed that a new set of proposals that Iran gave to European nations on Wednesday offered a viable basis for negotiations to end the dispute.

4. Poverty rate rose in 2008, Census reveals

In the recession, the nation's poverty rate climbed to 13.2 percent last year, up from 12.5 percent in 2007, according to an annual report released Thursday by the Census Bureau. The report also documented a decline in employer-provided health insurance and in coverage for adults.

The rise in the poverty rate, to the highest level since 1997, portends even larger increases this year, which has registered far higher unemployment than in 2008, economists said. -New York Times

WASHINGTON — The Obama administration's senior negotiator on global warming warned Thursday that developed and developing nations remained deeply divided in

talks on reducing greenhouse gases and that time was running out before United Nations treaty negotiations in December. -New York Times

6. NASA tests stage of new rocket

SALT LAKE CITY--the National Aeronautics and Space Administration successfully test fired the first stage of a new rocket that might soon be cancelled.

The firing was the first fullscale demonstration of a major component of the Ares I rocket that NASA has been developing for the past four years to replace the space shuttles, which are scheduled to be retired next year.
