ADAM SPINELLI has the opportunity to travel order to create a monograph about this," states Irwin. to Oslo, Norway next month. He will be going as part of a conference that works with post Yugoslavian states. Dr. Irwin recently completed another conference in Norway ob Slovenia in 2003.

"My work is to deal with the relationship of Bosnia-Herzegovina and the European Union," says Irwin. "The European Union has been a major actor both domestically and internationally in relationship to this country. I will also be focusing on how together with the United States and other major countries and unions, The European Union has spent billions of dollars to try and develop this small a fundamental part of being country."

- a scholarly book about a specific topic. Professors from all over the world gather in a space, normally the hometown of the book's editor, to discuss, draft, and organize the book.

"Each professor has a different field of interest and specialty," continues Irwin. "I will be focusing on the European Union, but there could be a variety of topics on Bosnia-Herzegovina like Education, nationality, and so on."

Countries from around the world are represented in this conference and also support this meeting for the production of a textbook. Dr. Irwin believes that this is a college professor.

"Personally I am grateful to Penn State for the opportunity of research because it allows professors to stay fresh and in touch with what is going on in the world. These meetings have a bearing on fairly specific subjects that may normally have nothing to do with our classes. But the subjects of the meetings all trickle down to the classroom level; that is what makes college teaching different and that's what is important."

Dr. Irwin also works with, and chairs the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies and had the opportunity to go to many countries to write books like this. He is excited to have this opportunity to go to Norway next
