Millcreek Township supervisors support a ban on the use of hand-held cell phones while

Supervisors voted, 2-0, Tuesday to endorse the state legislature's potential adoption of a law that would prohibit the use of laptop computers and cell phones, including for texting, while driving.

It's part of a growing movement that seeks to keep drivers focused on the road.

Philadelphia's ban on using cell phones took effect Tuesday.

The eight-member Erie Area Council of Governments could vote today on a resolution similar to Millcreek's.

Erie City Council will hold a public hearing today at 10:30 a.m. at City Hall, 626 State St. on an ordinance that would prohibit the use of cell phones while driving within city limits.

While the city is moving toward its own ban, Millcreek Supervisor Brian McGrath said the township supports a statewide prohibition.

High school seniors in the Erie region can participate in the fourth annual "Words to Be Heard" scholarship contest sponsored by the Edgar Snyder & Associates law offices.

In each case, the vehicle was left unlocked, Vernon Police Chief Randy Detzel said. Items reported stolen included cash, clothing and cigarettes.

New job ideas

With the U.S. unemployment rate above 10 percent for the first time in 27 years, a sense of urgency is growing.

On Thursday in Washington, President Barack Obama held a jobs summit, attended by 130 business leaders, union leaders and economists.

To the assembled experts. President Obama said that the U.S. government must act quickly in the fight against unemployment, but cautioned that he had only limited funds to create jobs.

"We cannot hang back and hope for the best," he warned. Indeed, any new spending plans aimed at reducing joblessness will run into opposition from Republicans in Congress.

They are already irritated by the billions of dollars spent on emergency bail-outs for banks and carmakers, begun under one of their own, President George W Bush.

Running up budget deficits to be paid for by future generations has a bad name in Washington. But an economist on the conservative side Mark Zandi of Economy.com, says deficits are a big concern, but not something we can afford to worry about right now.

"That's a problem not for 2009, not for 2010. That's a problem for 2011, 2012 and beyond," he says.

"We have to make sure that we don't go back into a recession, because if we go back into recession, the cost to taxpayers will be even greater. "The deficits will be measurably larger, so I think it's important to spend more money now."

Mr Zandi says some govern-

ment spending needs to be focused on state and local governments whose tax revenues have fallen, so that they do not have to lay off workers.

Another top priority is unemployment benefits, which normally run out after six months

in the U.S., though they have been extended in states with the highest unemployment



SYDNEY, Australia -- The Australian government plans to reintroduce its emission trading scheme to the parliament for a third time in February after a hostile Senate voted down the
