Arthur C. Clarke, famed inventor and authority on space travel, will speak in Erie Hall Thursday, October 28, at 8 p.m. The author of both fiction and nonfiction books, he is now writing the preface and epilogue to the astronauts own book of the Apollo mission.

Noted Scientist Speaks Oct. 28

Arthur C. Clarke, inventor of the communications satellite and co-author of the film "2001: A Space Odyssey" will speak in Erie Hall at 8 p.m. on Thursday, October 28. Admission will be free for Behrend students with activity cards and \$1 for other students.

Clarke is a man of truly diversified and remarkable achievements. An authority on space travel, he is the winner of the Franklin Institute's Gold Medal for having originated the communications satellite in a technical paper published in 1945.

A top-ranking science writer and "a master of science fiction" (The New Yorker), Mr. Clarke is the author of 40 books, both nonfiction and fiction. He is now writing the preface and epilogue to the astronauts' own book of the Apollo mission.

The mysteries of the sea fascinate Clarke as much as those of outer space. He wrote

"The Treasure of the Great Reef" about the successful expedition undertaken in 1963 by Clarke and others in search of a sunken ship in Ceylon, where they discovered a ton of silver coins.

Clarke is a graduate of King's College, London, with First Class Honors in Physics and Mathematics. He is past Chairman of the British Interplanetary Society and a member of the Academy of Astronautics, The Royal Astronomical Society, and other scientific organizations.

In the face of all these attainments, Arthur C. Clarke is not one to lose his sense of humor and balance. Rather, he has come up with a witty truth that he once called "Clarke's Law." This is: "When a distinguished but elderly scientist states that something is possible, he is almost certainly right. When he states that something is impossible, he is very probably wrong."

SGA Election Rally

An election rally for the Student Government Association candidates was held in the Reed Student Union Building Tuesday night, October 12, at 7:30 for clarification of the candidates ideas and plans for the SGA.

Candidates were questioned as to their ideas on such topics as the feasibility of community involvement, the number of blacks, on campus, and the organization of the SGA itself.

The main problems cited by the candidates include apathy on campus, lack of communication between commuters and residents, campus isolation, the limited black population and its accompanying problems, visitation hours, the relative power of SGA, athletic apathy, the lack of social activities, the quality of education, and Behrend pollution.

Joe Zani, (4-LA-Kersey) Vice President of SGA, stated, "the turnout of students was very depressing, viewing the number of students on campus. Some of the people should have been running for the Student Union Board."

Fantastic Voyage

Fantastic Voyage, with Raquel Welch, Arthur Kennedy, and Edmond O'Brien, will be showing at 7 and 9 p.m. Sunday, October 24, in the RUB lecture hall. The price of admission will be 35 cents for students with activity cards and \$1 for other students.

Fantastic Voyage is the story of a famous scientist who is so severely wounded by enemy agents that surgery is impossible. Combined Miniature Deterrent Forces (CMDFF), a super-secret organization, is called on to shrink men and equipment to microbe size so they can work from inside the scientist's brain to repair the injury. A new atomic sub is shrunk as are its five passengers and injected into the bloodstream, working its way to the brain with a time limit of 60 minutes. The technical wizardry is a brilliant projection in this science fiction film of the inner man.

Readers Conference

The Clarion State College will sponsor a Readers Theatre Workshop, Friday and Saturday, October 22 and 23 for Interpretive Reading.

The subject of the Workshop will be Experimental Treatment of Humorous Prose, Poetry or Drama.

The program will feature presentations by eight groups including those from Clarion, Kutztown, and Penn State, University Park. The presentations will be critiqued by Dr. Frank Galati of the Speech Department of Northwestern University. Also on the program will be a performance by Julia Cummings Wing, professor of Speech and Theatre at Temple University.

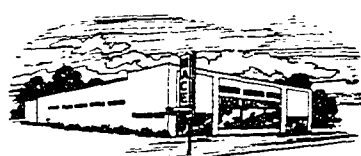

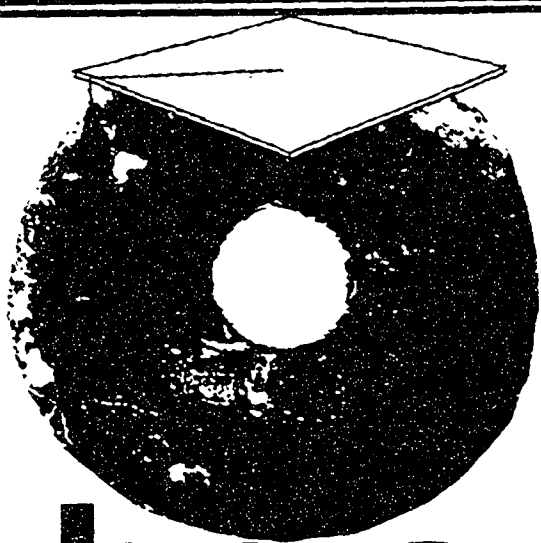
