On Sunday, November 12, the movie classic "The Mouse That Roared" will have two showings at 7 and 9 p.m. in the RUB Lec-ture Hall. The film concerns the story of a tiny country which declares war on the United States, while expecting to lose the battle, and stars Peter Sellers, Jean Seberg, William Hartnell and David Kossoff.

The little group invades New York during an air raid alert, when the streets are deserted. Unaware that they are supposed to lose the war, they capture a scientist and his assistant and their newly invented, terrifying weapon. The complications that arise because of their mistake make for a delightful story. Prices for "The Mouse That Roared" are 35 cents with an activity card and a dollar without.

Book Review A Social History of the Bicycle "These bladder-wheeled devices of the demon of darkness

are contrivances to trap the feet of the unwary and skin the nose of the innocent. They are full of guile and deceit. When you think you have broken one to ride and subdued its wild and satanic nature, behold it bucketh you off in the road and teareth a great hole in your pants.'

This opinion of the bicycle, expressed in a Sunday sermon in Baltimore in 1896, did not reflect public consensus. This is hown, conclusively and oftentimes hilariously, in A Social History of the Bicycle by Prof. Robert A. Smith(American Heritage Press, \$9.95)

What began as an attempt to discover the sources of the bicycle craze of the Gay Nineties evolved into a light hearted but scholarly study of the impact of the cycle on American culture, and the extensive heritage the "craze" left behind. A professor of Social Sciences at California State College in San Bernardino, the author treats the origins of the two-wheeler, impact of the machine on the economy, morals, transportation, sport, highway improvement, dress reform, communications - the whole




