Behrend's Basketball team, suffering a rather disappointing campaign, finally made coach Roger Sweeting's dream into reality. The Cubs put it all together and wound up with its most convincing win of the season: 111 to 76 over Eisenhower College. Like a finely tuned machine, the Cubs outshot, out rebounded and out hustled the Generals, to snap its four game losing streak.

Glenn McKinney paced the way for Behrend by canning a game high of 27 points. Glenn hit on 12 field goals and added three from the foul line. He was followed closely by teammates Mark Boroway and Denny Deiner with 24 and 20 points respectively. The latter also contributed 21 rebounds.

Eisenhower held an early 12 point lead in the first half when the Cubs went into a cold spell. This didn't last for long as they went on a wild spree hitting from all over the court. They finally tied the game when Mark Boroway hit from the charity stripe. This gave the Cubs a 42 to 36 halftime lead. From there on it was all down hill for Behrend.

The Cubs came out in the second half all fired up and blew the Generals right off the court. Led by their captain Glenn McKinney, the Cubs began to fast break the Eisenhower team. This simply destroyed them. Glenn hit for eight straight points right at the start and opened up a 50 to 36 lead. Each time the Generals tried to come back, Behrend would build an even bigger lead. Everyone started canning shots, and before the delighted crowd in Erie Hall knew exactly what happened, the Cubs went over the century mark for the first time this year. It happened when Ron Miller hit a 15 foot jumper from the side with 2:09 remaining.
