And now, no one is marching anymore, teachers strike more often than students, things are very...quiet.

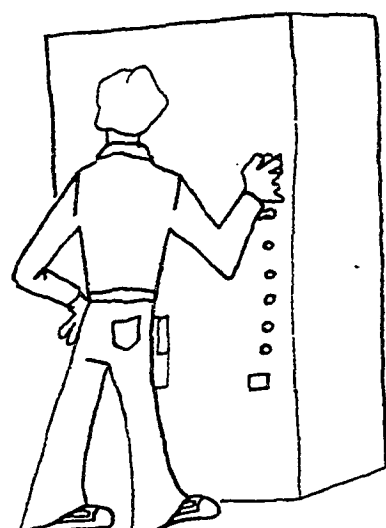
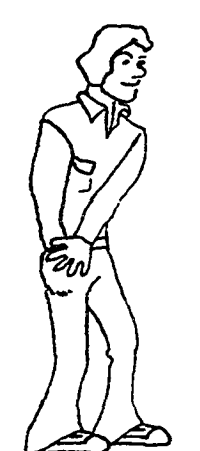

the leaders seem to be getting caught without our help.

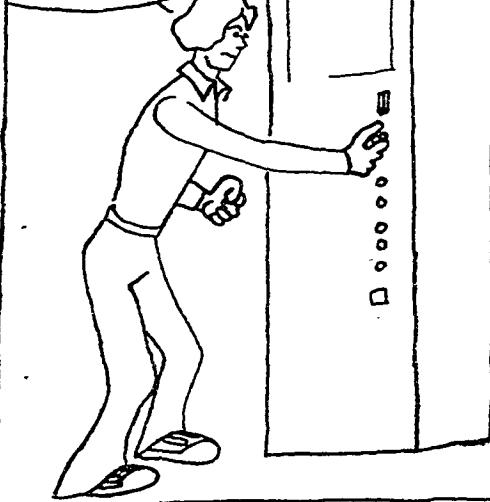
