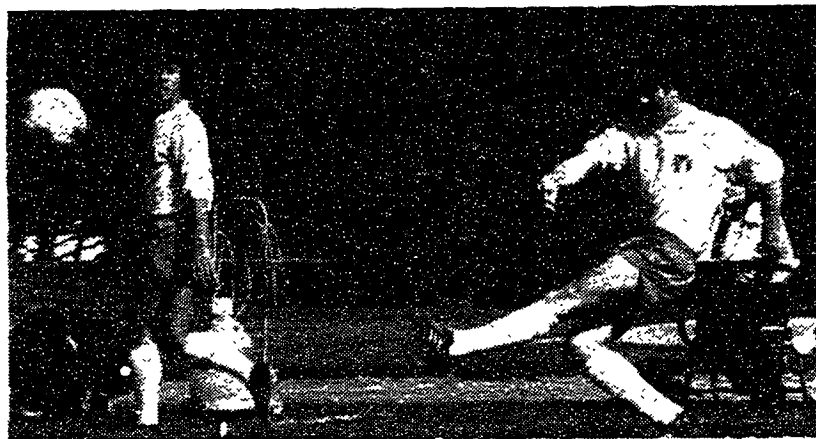
and Mark Stillwagon will be out of the action for a while.

The single score by Indiana was a penalty kick by their inside right. They made fourteen shots during the course of the game, while our offense had twenty-one attempts. Goalie saved an Indiana ball from scoring nine times.

Coach Lauffer as "better in the first half than in the second. We really did a good job of controlling the play, but weakened a little in the second half. They put the pressure on us all through the game, but we stood up to it. This was an important win for us, bringing four points in the conference."
