(WASHINGTON, D.C.) Pennsylvania Senator Hugh Scott recently testified before the Subcommittee on Water Resources of the Senate Committee on Public Works concerning the need for six important public works projects in Pennsylvania. These projects are consideration under for authorization and inclusion in the Water Resources 1976 Development Act. If they are authorized and funded by Congress. Pennsylvania would receive nearly \$112 million in Federal assistance for these projects.

The Pennsylvania projects he cited in his testimony include a plan to build five permanent offshore breakwaters with concurrent and replenishment work in order to preserve the Peninsula and its beaches from erosion caused by Lake Erie. Along with Senator Schweiker, Senator Scott has also introduced legislation. S.1201, to provide for this project.


