The Behrend Cubs made their season slate 3-1 Wednesday night as they blanked the Gannon Knights 3-0 in view of 1,700 fans at the Erie Stadium.

The first twenty minutes of play took place in the Cubs end of the field, keeping our goalie, Sam King, on his toes. But nonetheless, it was the Cubs who scored first.

Our Number 10, Frank Pollock scored the initial tally when Mike Oliu headed the ball Frank's way

and he booted it past Gannon's netminder Dean Maticchiera from eight yards at the 23:29 mark.

Less than five minutes later, Tony Orlando scored a penalty kick to make it 2-0. The kick was the second consecutive hit, as he repeated himself after being told a Behrend player was standing in the penalty area during his first attempt.

It soon became 3-0 with less than four minutes for play in the first half when Tony found Frank

open again and hit him with a perfect set-up that our freshman from Mt. Lebanon booted into the mesh for this second score of the evening.

The second half was evenly played with Gannon coming close at times, but the Behrend defenders stayed tight as they posted their first shut-out of the 79-80 season.

The Cubs outshot the Knights 19-17; 6-7 in the first half and 13-10 in the second. Both teams ended the game with eight shots on goal.

Fifth ranked Nebraska scored four touch downs in the second

period of Saturday's football thriller to roll up a 42-17 victory over our eighteenth ranked Penn State.

Penn State opened the scoring on a nineteen yard Dayle Tate to Brad Scovill pass midway through the first quarter. Tom Wise widened the lead 14-0, picking off a Hager pass and returning it thirty yards. But before the half ended touchdowns by Miller, Brown and Franklin of Nebraska boosted the margin 28-14.

Herb Menhardt kicked a 35-yard field goal early in the third period to pull the Nittany Lions to a 28-17 deficit. Soon after, Tim Wurth and Jim Kotera scored a 7-yard and 5-yard runs, respectively, to boost the unbeaten Cornhuskers to a 3-0 season mark while dropping Penn State to 1-2.
