Larson comments, "We had written three manuscripts for the calculus texts, each 1,000 to 1,500 typed pages and the publisher simply turned them down." In 1976 they tried again with the assistance of math instructor David Heyd who wrote all of the problems and their solutions. Calculus 1st Edition eventually came out in 1979, and alhough it was not an "instant success,"
Larson says, "it did well for a

Dennis Galletta, instructor of M.I.S., recently had a Cobol textbook published. COBOL with an Emphasis on Structured Program Design took Galletta two years (mainly on nights and weekends) to publish. Of the 7,500 copies initially printed, 270 copies have already been sold based only on drafts sent to potential buyers.
