Africa—that is Apartheid is offensive to anyone who believes in freedom. Given the per capita income of Africa, the Blacks in South Africa seem to be better off. than those in other parts of Africa." He added, "I am no supporter of Apartheid but that the Blacks in South Africa could be made worse off than they are right now and much of the policy of the "do-gooders" around the United States if they were inactive would make them worse off."

Making one final note, Williams said, "If we had economic sanctions against South Africa and stoped all trade by anybody but South Africa, those people would starve. The result would be something similar to Ethiopia in Mozambique. Complete sanctions against South Africa would lead to no food. A hint would be to morally condemn Apartheid."

Through Dr. Walter Williams'

lecture, we are able to see how the things that we take for granted-property rights, both public and private and the allocation of resources--can drastically effect

the way in which we live. It also shows that sometimes people do not know about rights until it is almost too late to change and make a difference.
