

Assistant Dean of Student Affairs. Any club at any time between now and April 15 can apply for a mini-grant.

Upon approval from Grimm, requests go to Behrend's budget committee, after which Dohn Harshbarger, Dean of Student Affairs, and Doug Gerow, SGA President sign the application. The request then procedes to University Park and is distributed to the mini-grant committee, which includes Grimm, Tom Eakin, Vice President of Student Services and Programming at University Park, Ed Mottle, Director of Student Services and

Programming at Fayette, Pat Byeres, Director of Student Services and Programming at Mont Alto, Lynne Duffner, Chairman of Council of Commonwealth Student Governments (CCSG) and two other CCSG representatives.

There is a total mini-grant budget, university-wide, of 25,000 dollars. "There is no limit to the amount of money each campus can have," Grimm said, "and there is still time to submit for this year," she added. Any need in the area of programming or equipment can be met by this fund.
