Operation Identification is a project run by the Pennsylvania Crime Watch Program designed to help prevent theft. This article will discuss the project and how it may be used by students, faculty and staff here at Behrend.

Valuables are engraved with the owner's drivers license number

(and state abbreviation) and an Operation Identification warning sticker is put on one of the exterior doors of the premises to warn potential thieves away.

Theft prevention is the ultimate goal of the project, as hopefully the thief will be discouraged from stealing valuables that can be traced easily. Anything of value

should be engraved such as bikes, cameras, clocks, computers, tools, stereos, T.V.'s, calculators, typewriters and the like. Engrave the valuables on the bottom or back, so as to not deface them. Thieves will find the engraving and will be deterred from taking such items.

Anyone at Behrend can participate in Operation Identifica-

tion. Engravers and stickers are available at South Cottage and may be signed out there. We hope everyone takes advantage of this great tool to help prevent theft. If you have any questions, please call Police and Safety at 898-6101.

Behrend, often referred to by other commonwealth campuses as the "country club" for its attractive grounds, is rich in local history.

The original Behrend Estate was built for Ernst Behrend and his wife Mary. Ernst and brother Otto, co-founded the Hammermill Paper Company. The estate was first used by the Behrends as as farm and country house but soon after the tragic death of their son, it became their permanent home.

The Behrends led a life of splendor, entertaining such guests as Lowell Thomas, perhaps by their spring-fed swimming pool (a first in this area.) Bruno, the family dog was even shipped to Germany to have his portrait painted, the finished work can be viewed in the lobby to the Memorial Room in the Glenhill Farm House (Administratin Building.)

"We are going to retain, in our master plan, this part of Behrend asthe historical core," said Director of Development and University Relations, Susan Black-Keim. "As Behrend emerges as a college, that is one of the things we want to make more distinct—our own traditions. That is one of things that we really do have but have never emphasized," Black-Keim explained.

A more in depth study of the Behrend "dynasty" and the-estate's evolution into what is now known as Behrend College will appear in subsequent issues of the Collegian.

Apartment complex expands with Phase II

Phase II of the Behrend apartment complex is under way. The Pennsylvania State University Board of Trustees approved the construction of a second apartment complex.

A pre-bid meeting is slated for early March and results of the bidding will be announced roughly two weeks later. The ground breaking date has been proposed for May with a completion goal set for the end of this summer.

The new apartment complex will be located southwest of the already existent complex. The exact location is pending until further land surveying is com- the next five years at 2,200-2,500 students.

The new apartments, like the first complex, will be self-funding through student rent. No funds from the Capital Campaign will be used. The new apartments are being built to satisfy existent housing needs, not, as some have suggested, to accomadate an enrollment increase.
