

Sylvan Wind Quintet re-discovers masterworks

Since 1976 the Sylvan Wind Quintet has been captivating audiences with its brilliant performances and imaginative repertoire. Based in New York City, the ensemble is the only one of its kind to present an annual subscription series of music for wind quintet, which has been critically acclaimed for its innovative programming concepts since its inception in 1978. The series is currently performed at

Carnegie Recital Hall, and includes a special concert sponsored by the Carnegie Hall Corporation.

The Sylvan Winds are regularly featured at Lincoln Center's Mostly Mozart Festival, both indoors and out, and have also appeared at the White Mountains Festival and the Mohonk Mountain House, as well as touring major university and chamber music series.

The Quintet has performed with such renowned guest artists as Gerard Schwarz, Arthur Barbab and Gunther Schuller as well as numerous U.S. and NY premieres. Their repertoire ranges from the standard classical quintet literature to unusual re-discovered rarities and delightful transcriptions of familiar masterworks. Concerts of special 'themes' spotlighting women composers, specific instruments

within the Quintet, music of particular nationalities, and the cooperation of guest artists add great variety and focus to their programs. Unusual multi-media

events such as childrens' concerts combining puppet theater with music are yet another facet of this remarkable ensemble's exciting career.

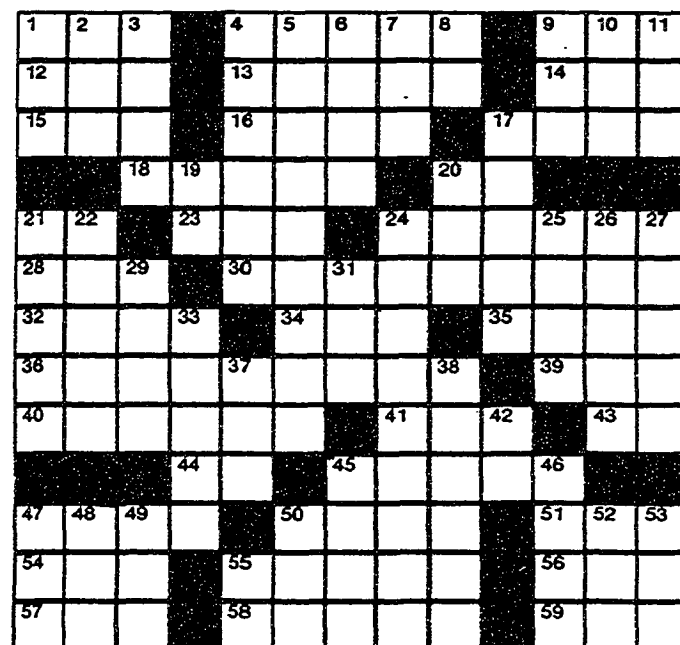
For enlistees who qualify for the G.I. Bill and ACF, there are sixty special training skills to choose from, a widespread selection from communications to mechanics to food service, taught


