The contestants were put into glass cubicals about the size of a phone book and had the opportunity to grab at \$50 bills that were being blown around inside. Each contestant was wearing an apron in which to stuff the money that they had

caught. At the end of the time alloted them, Armstrong and Sobotta had managed to collect \$2100 between them. This sum is the largest donation to the fund so

When Sobotta arrived at Behrend in 1984 she wanted to start a Found Money Fund here. With a little delibration she decided to put her plan into action.

The fund is just what the name implies, Found Money. It is small change, and some one's and five dollar bills. Sobotta wanted to start the fund to generate funds for the athletic department.
