

Crime Fighters Honored

For the past five years the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime Prevention and Delinquency has annually awarded 24 Pennsylvania residents 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place certificates for services donated to the community in crime prevention.

This year Lisa Marie Lyle and Lori Davison, former Behrend students at University Park, and Donald Wolfgang, lab technician, have been awarded 3rd place certificates for their zealous effort in

Behrend's Crime Watch program. Davison convinced 40% of Perry Hall to volunteer, Lyle - 30% of Niagara Hall, and Wolfgang got 40% of the faculty and staff.

Approximately 500 students are volunteers in Behrend's Crime Watch program.

The Crime Watch Program began in the fall of '86. Volunteers simply call in any suspicious actions or people. The police do the rest.

The awards ceremony was held on January 6. Attending was the Dean of Students, Director of Operations, and Dean Lilley, who presented the awards.

Pioneers of Behrend's Crime Watch Program, the three are also being nominated for the local Rave Award, which will be presented in April. Behrend Police and Safety Services Officer Todd Alan, another pioneer of the program, added that "Our Crime Watch Program is an ongoing thing. We have 7 groups and have 7 volunteer group leaders." Other concerns deal with confronting problems on campus, such as rape, drunk driving, and residence safety.

extensive communications between the student body and the faculty. "I want to get into a field with a lot of communication needs and I think this will help develop my communication skills."

The Faculty Senate is composed of Senators from each commonwealth campus and college. Vahey will be the third Behrend

Student to be a member of the Senate since a new policy was enacted allowing Behrend to have two Senators.

The Senate meets regularly throughout the academic year to discuss issue pertinent to the University. Agendas are sent to members prior to each meeting, which the Senators are expected to review in order to be prepared to participate in the Senate meetings. Faculty at Behrend discuss items on the agenda with the Senate members before the monthly meeting.

Gregory Goldsmith, the student member of the Senate for the 1987-1988 academic year said that the Senate first meets in committees. Later in the day, an assembly

meeting takes place. The assembly discusses and votes on issues raised before the Senate. Such topics are grading policies, computer field programs, and the implementation of new programs throughout the University. Goldsmith said that the Senate meetings are conducted in a manner similar to that in the House of Representatives. Each Senator is assigned a seat and is recognized

before speaking. Bryce Jordan, the President of Penn State, and other top officials attend the meetings to discuss Penn State's academics and overall ranking with other universities.

Vahey's duties as a Student Faculty Senator will officially start at the beginning of the 1988-1989 academic year. She will attend a Senate meeting in April to learn

how the Senate conducts business and to get an overview of what to expect next fall.

Vahey will also be a member of Behrend's Faculty Council. She will have full voting power on the Council as well as on the Senate.

Looking forward to her new position, Vahey said, "It involves the entire University."

Professor To Share Expertise Overseas

Associate Professor of Industrial Engineering Anthony Salvia has been invited to speak on Quality Control Education at the Seventh Annual Conference of the Israeli Society for Quality Insurance in Tel Aviv, Israel.

Salvia's invitation was a surprise that came in a letter from Professor Amos Noica of the Israeli Institute of Technology.

The invitation was prompted by an article Salvia had written on quality control education, the application of simple management and statistical tools to manufacturing as well as non-

manufacturing enterprises. The article, which appeared in the Aug. 1987 edition of "Quality Progress", hit a nerve in the quality control community, drawing numerous letters to the editor, about a dozen of which were published.

The article asked the questions: Why isn't quality control education taught to students? Don't we have a responsibility to teach quality control education? If yes, who is going to teach it? And to which students do we teach it?

These questions hit home with a lot of people in the quality control community and Salvia's invitation shows that quality control education is a world-wide concern.

Salvia will be presenting his ideas in Israel on Nov. 8-10, 1988.

Election Time Mon., Mar. 28 is the last day to register to vote in the primary election. In the Apr. 26 primary voters will choose candidates to run under Republican and Democratic party banners for several offices including President, United States Senate, Congress, and attorney general.

In Pennsylvania, citizens must be enrolled in a qualified political party to vote in the primary. To register to vote in the primary an individual must be 18 years old on or before the day after the election. Further details are included in registration applications available at district and area public offices.

Individuals who have not voted recently should check with the voter registration office at the courthouse in Erie to determine if their registration is current.
