



'FLAP' TO BE PRESENTED

Jerry Adler's production of "Flap," playing January 27 at 8:00 in the auditorium, is as contemporary as tomorrow's headline.

Directed by Sir Carol Reed, the proud and distinguished Englishman whose "Oliver!" won six Academy Awards, including Best Picture and Best Director, "Flap" is the story of a band of Indians to call attention to the despair and futility in which they live on a Southwestern reservation.

The star of "Flap" is Anthony Quinn, playing his first

Indian role since winning an Oscar for "Viva, Zapata!" He is a tough, hard-drinking Indian who laments the social and economic neglect of his people. His solution is to hijack a railroad train, claim Phoenix for his tribe and precipitate the Last Great Indian Uprising.

Quinn's co-stars are Shelley Winters, Claude Akins, Tony Bill and Victor Jory in this thoroughly entertaining screen version of Clair Huffaker's best-selling novel, "Nobody Loves a Drunken Indian."

JANUARY 20- Varsity basketball against Spring Garden College, the game to be played at Chestnut Hill, Pa.

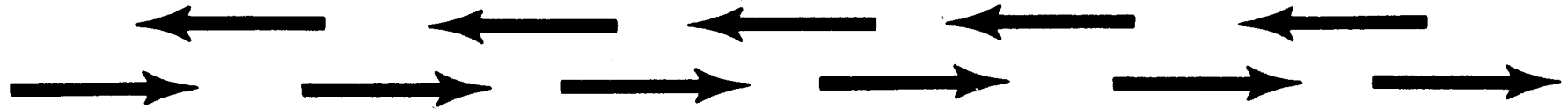
JANUARY 21- Mass at 3:45 PM in the Student Center.
