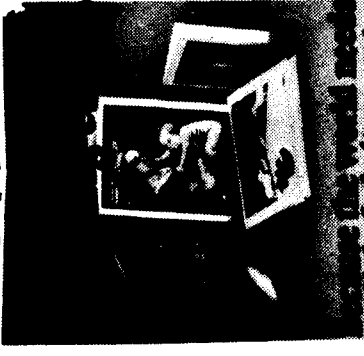
Mark "Rudz" Rudzik, places Christmas decorations in Wrisberg Hall last Friday night.

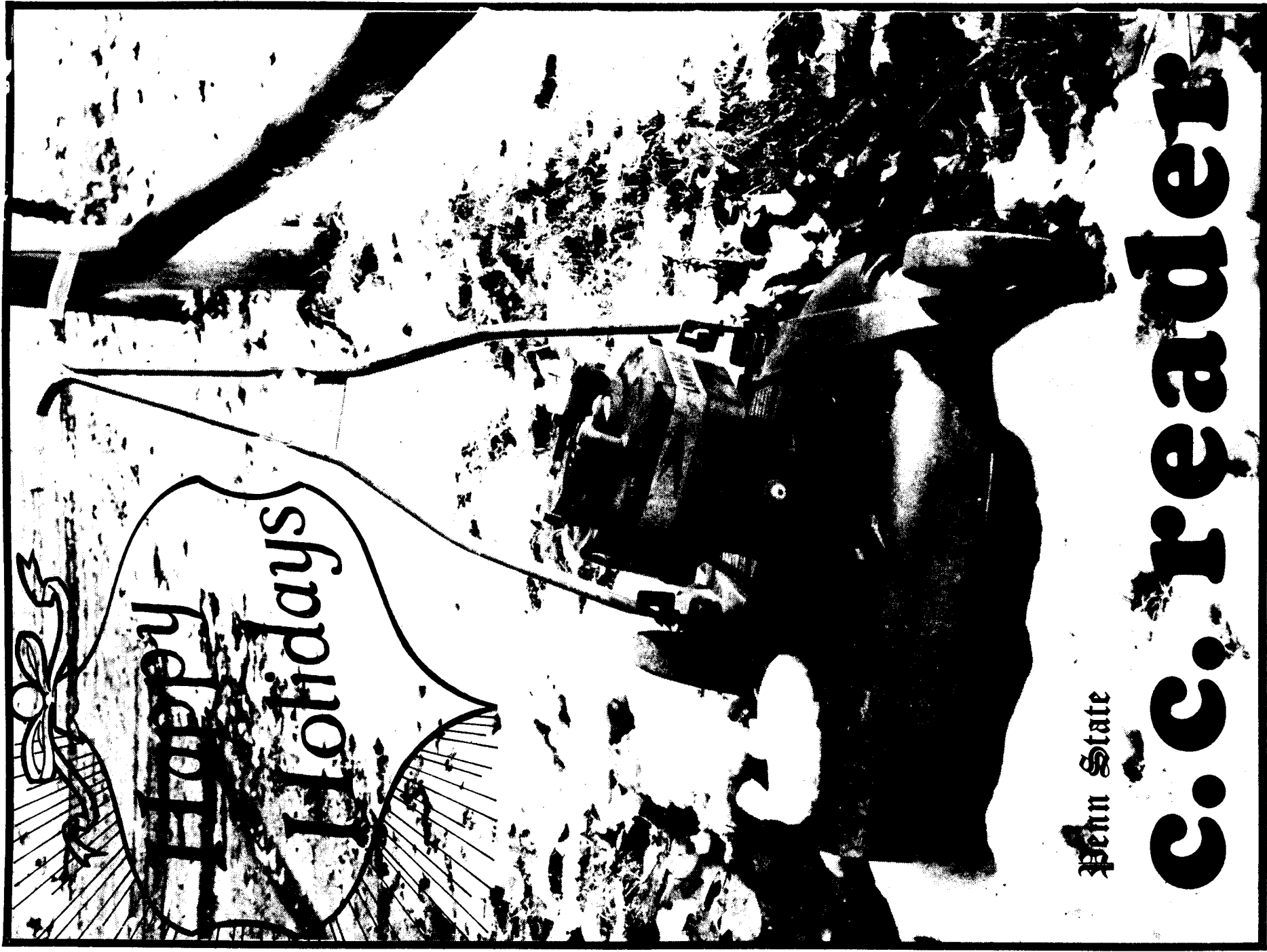
