The first annual Penn State-Capitol Campus Community Psychology Conference will be held on Saturday, May 3 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The theme will be "Community as Client." Sponsored by the masters program in psychosocial science, the conference will explore the various roles of a community psychologist. A morning panel will discuss "The Roles of a Community Psychologist;" an afternoon workshop will discuss "Repoliticizing City Government," "Are Cities Sane Places?" and "The City Bankrupt." The luncheon address will be given by Frank M. Ochberg, M.D. director, division of mental health service programs, National Institute of Mental Health, Washington, D.C.
