


## **Prof Probes** Amino Acids

Joseph Pedulla, assistant professor of physics has been awarded a research contribution of \$1,500 by Hershey Foods Corporation.

Pedulla plans to use this support for his research of electronic and surface properties of amino acids. He says the investigation will help to gain a fundamental understanding of the roles proteins and enzymes play in biological processes and systems.

His long range plan is to set a laboratory for the continuing research of these topics that would also be a source of expertise to local industries in the field of physics.

Pedulla is a resident of Elizabethtown and has taught physics and mathematics at Capitol since 1971.



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
