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C. C. Gives Mount Alto "Capitol Punishment"

The Capitol Campus basketball team defeated Mont Alto 73-69 at the old Middletown gymnasium last Tuesday night. The victory brings Capitol's record, for the 1975-76 season, to nine wins and four losses.

Capitol got into trouble early in the game when the Mont Alto shooting blitzkrige forced Capitol into the undesireable situation of playing catch up ball.

John Betchal and Delbert Riley led the Mont Alto scoring attack with 20 and 14 points respectively. So, at halftime Capitol, plagued by bad shooting and weak defensive play, trailed Mont Alto 28 to 35.

Perhaps due to an inspiring lecture by captain Jim Baker (who many

believe to be instrumental in this year's successfull season) or the strong vocal support of the cheerleaders and fans, Capitol, looking like a different team, came quarter.

Jim Baker caught fire on the outside court, scoring 16 points in the second half. Meanwhile, Joe Grant and Rich Fry took turns ripping down rebounds and scoring on the inside court. Fry accumulated a total of 18 points in the game with Grant adding 17 more. Ed Pagola and Scott Kurtz helped to control the ball with a serious display of coordinated dribbling and passing on their part.

With 13:22 remaining in the game, Capitol took the lead for the first time 41-39 and held on to it for the win.
