"Soon as I'm finished."

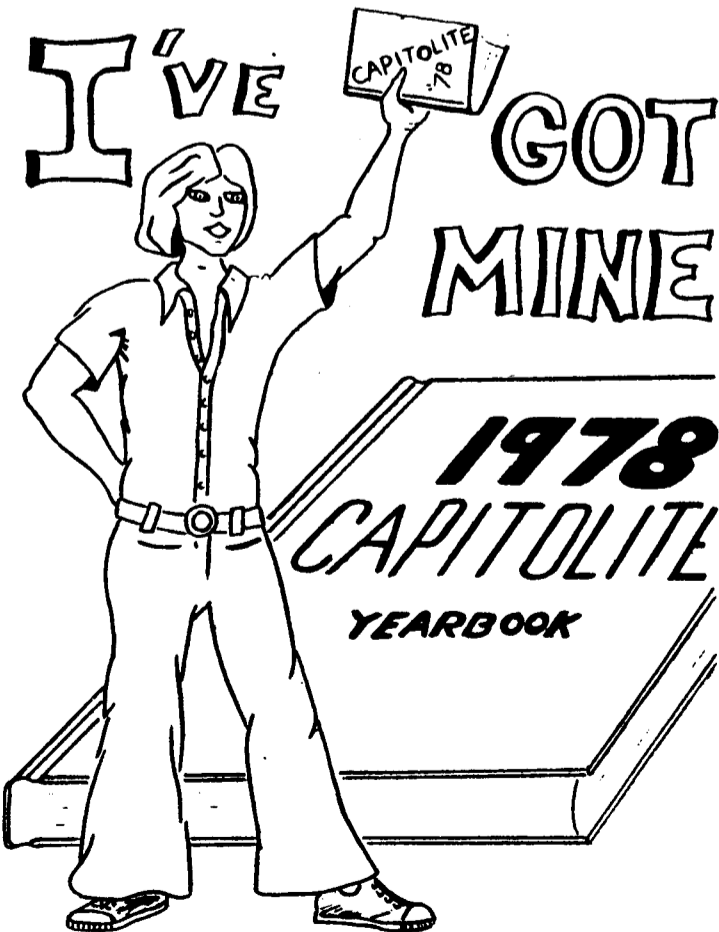
"Soon as I'm finished. Listen you want a cup of coffee?"
