Labeled "the greatest Russian play ever written" by the scholar Nabkov, this sparkling comedy is directed by Liviv Civlei and has received an excellent review by Brendan Gill in the New Yorker.

Circle in the Square is a beautiful theater in the round that insures superb seating for every one.

Tickets are available at half-price for this group outing, and will sell for six dollars per person. All students, faculty, and staff of Capitol Campus are welcome to join the group, and guests are welcome.

Persons interested in going to the play may purchase or reserve tickets from Jill Hart, secretary of the Humanities department, office W360. All tickets must be paid for by Monday, Oct. 16.
