

# State Over Army

The Nittany Lions of Penn State, led by the running of Matt Suhey and Booker Moore, rolled over the Cadets of Army, 24 - 3, on Sat. at Beaver Stadium.

Suhey rushed for 225 yards and two touchdowns, including a 61-yard run for a score in the final quarter. Moore ran for 103 yards on the day, scoring State's first points on a one-yard plunge in the opening period.

Both squads scored via the

field goal, with PSU's Herb Menhardt booting a 24-yarder, and Army's Dave Aucoin kicking a 44-yarder for the visiting Cadets. The contest was never really in doubt, but the outcome might have been closer had not Lion defender Joel Coles made an outstanding tackle on the final play of the first half. Army split end Mike Fahnestock made a leaping catch at the State one-yard line, but Coles came up to meet the Cadet receiver, hitting him in midair

and driving him backwards as the first half came to a close.

For the Lions, the victory improved their record to 3 - 2, while the Cadets fell to a 2 - 2 - 1 mark for the season. State's next opponent is Syracuse, with the game set for Giants Stadium in New Jersey this Sat. afternoon. The Orangemen are 4 - 2 for the year, the losses being to Ohio State and Temple. Syracuse is forced to play all of its games on the road this year, as work on its new stadium is not yet com-

pleted.

Syracuse has an explosive offense, led by quarterback Bill Hurley, who will be the finest signal-caller the Nittany Lions will face this season. Art Monk is used both as a running back and a wide receiver, so look for Hurley to try to get the ball to him as much as possible. The key to the Syracuse offense is sophomore Joe Morris, who last week led the country in rushing. Morris is a small, quick back who will pose a big

problem for the State defense. The speedy runners have given PSU trouble in 1979, two prime examples being Texas A & M's Curtis Dickey and Nebraska's Jarvis Redwine. For the Lions to win, they must first contain the running of Morris, then try to shut down the air attack of Hurley-to-Monk. The latter will be difficult for PSU to do with any consistency, so Coach Paterno will be looking for his offense to control the football ...and put some points on the board.

## Coach found, looking for team

Several women needed to make baskets. No experience necessary. Apply to R. M. Smitley, Multi-Purpose Building, Penn State Capitol Campus, Middletown, PA, on Monday, Oct. 22, at 3:30 p.m. Telephone 783-6266.

No, Reuben Smitley hasn't taken up basket-weaving. This is just a "last-ditch effort" to recruit a women's basketball team. Smitley has tried placing posters on the bulletin boards and putting little notices on the back page of the C.C. Reader. All in vain.

Smitley, the Athletic Director, Capitol Campus, almost sounds like he's pleading when he says, "We'd really love to see a women's basketball team" at Capitol. He's even gone so far as to locate a coach for the team-to-be.

The new coach is Sherry Conway, a former assistant women's coach at Gettysburg College (1977-1979). Conway is originally from Titusville, PA. She is a 1973 graduate of Slippery Rock State College, and was a health and physical education instructor at Harrisburg's Bishop McDevitt High School from 1973 to 1976.

Conway was also the varsity women's basketball and tennis coach at McDevitt. She even found time to coach hockey and track at Red Land High School.

During her stay at McDevitt the women's basketball team became the league champs with a record of 12 and 0. Similarly, the women's team at Gettysburg went 14 and 3 for two seasons with Conway's assistance. "That was the winningest record they ever had there," Conway said.

In reference to Capitol

Campus, however, Conway said: "This is probably the only school where the athletic Director is a male -- pleading for a female head coach. I've always had a desire to be the head coach on the college level," she said. Conway is quick to admit that, for now, she's "a coach without a team." But she hopes that situation will change after Monday's meeting.

Smitley said that he hopes the team can play a 12- to 14-game schedule this year, made up of a mixture of two- and four-year colleges. Next year, however, "I'd like to drop Junior College playing," he said.

Smitley said he would contact "all four-year schools comparable to Capitol Campus." Some of these would include: York College, Spring Garden College, Eastern College, Lancaster Bible College, Lincoln University and Coppen State College.
