

State goin' bowlin'

As the Nittany Lions of Penn State head into the last four games of their 1979 schedule, they carry with them a four-game winning streak, along with hopes for a major post-season bowl berth.

Since losing two of its first three, State has bounced back with wins over Maryland, Army, Syracuse, and West Virginia. These teams are not what one would call national powerhouses, but there is reason to believe that the Lions can continue their winning ways, even though the combined record of PSU's last four foes is an excellent 21-8 slate.

The reasons why State should finish the year at 9-2 are the same ones that have

made the Lions so successful the past decade; they are running the ball consistently well, and the defense is completely shutting down the opposition's offense.

During the win streak, the PSU running game has looked nothing short of awesome. Fullback Matt Suhey might even be considered a late-season darkhorse candidate for the Heisman Trophy, awarded to college football's player-of-the-year. He has gained over 500 yards rushing in his last four games alone, and is on his way to breaking several career marks at Penn State. Booker Moore has also done tremendously well during the last four games, and has become one of the top break-

away threats in the nation from his halfback position. And, Moore has accomplished this while added pressure was on him with the leg injury to freshman speedster Curt Warner.

The Lion defense has been as solid as last year's exceptional defenders lately, and with the improvement of the State secondary in recent weeks, PSU's opponents will find it difficult to get to the Lions end zone. But to be sure, the last four games of '79 will be anything but breathers for Penn State.

This Saturday afternoon, the University of Miami Hurricanes come to Beaver Stadium with a 3-4 record. They are an erratic team that might

give PSU trouble if their passing game reaches its potential. Penn State should handle the Hurricanes, but the next three weeks will contain the Lions' toughest three games in a row in a long, long time.

After the Miami game this weekend, the Lions will travel to North Carolina for their final road contest of the year against the N.C. Wolfpack. N.C. State is currently 6-2, and the Wolfpack always gives PSU a rough time; this year should be no exception. On November 17th, the Temple Owls enter Beaver Stadium, looking for the national recognition that has eluded them so far this season. The Owls are 6-1 at this

point, with their only loss coming at the hands of State's final regular season opponent, the Pitt Panthers, by a 10-9 margin. Pitt is also 6-1 right now, and the heated rivalry between these two Eastern football powers is set for Beaver Stadium on December 1st. The date of the game was moved back one week to accommodate national television. Pitt's only loss was to the Tar Heels of North Carolina early in the season.

Should Penn State win their remaining games, look for them to be invited someplace other than State College, Pa, to spend their New Year's Day.

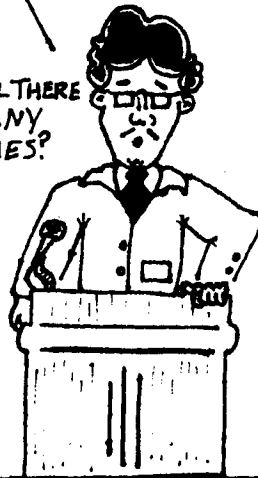
