A Message From The President

I would like to remind everyone that they are welcome to attend the SGA meetings-they are open to everyone. However, there is one stipulation.

According to the SGA Constitution passed last spring (Article VI, Section 8, Floor Privileges), there will be a separate section on the agenda for introduction of visitors by sponsoring senators or officers if a visitor wishes to speak on an item that is contained on that meeting's agenda. If a visitor would like to be put on the agenda, the visitor must request floor privileges one week prior to the meeting at which the respective visitor is to speak. The request will be granted with two-thirds majority of the Senate. The following week, the visitor will be put on the agenda and introduced to the SGA by a sponsoring officer or senator.
