departmental chairman to the president."

Jordan left Kentucky to become chairman of the department of music at UTA and was then appointed vice president for student affairs. In 1970 he was named president ad interim of the Austin campus, served for a year, and was named president of UTD, the upper division campus.

Besides his activities in the University of Texas System, Jordan also served as president of the Association of Upper Level Colleges and Universities and on various committees of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Because he comes from a very successful academic career, we asked him if at 59 he sees himself being a caretaker of Penn State until his retirement. He said, "No, I promise

not to be a caretaker...Penn State is a complex institution and there is a lot to be done."

"We need to tie the University to industrial development, the high technology industries, with professional ties," Jordan said. "We know that Governor Thornburgh has been critical in this development and we hope to help the governor, whoever he is, in developing the economy of Pennsylvania, probably along the lines of high technology such as engineering,

applied science, quantum electronics, laser, robotics, industrial biology, microelectronics and the basic sciences at the heart of business and industrial development." He feels these areas are necessary for growth in Pennsylvania during the next 20 to 30 years.

Jordan will have more to say to us on these subjects at Capitol Campus soon. Jordan told Capitol Times he plans to visit our campus before the end of this year. See editorial page 5
