Fall grads told to develop self-awareness

So said by Dr. James D. South, director of student affairs at Capitol Campus, to 139

students in fall term commencement exercises on December 11, 1982.

Dr. South told the graduates that the person who has gained self-awareness will be the person most able to utilize the freedom which distinguishes and benefits humanity.

The role of the university in developing this self-awareness, he said, must be to "facilitate the development of competent individuals" by providing each graduate with an understanding

of the world and (with the ability) to think and analyze.

Dr. Theodore L. Gross, provost and dean of Capitol Campus, presided over the ceremony. Assisting him in the conferring of degrees was The Honorable Robert G. Scanlon, secretary of education and member of the University's Board of Trustees; Dr. Robert W. Carrubba, associate dean of the University's Graduate School; and Dr. Duane R. Smith, associate provost and

dean of Capitol Campus.

Bachelors' degrees were awarded to 112 students and Master's degrees to 27. Undergraduate degrees were awarded in business administration, elementary education, humanities, social sciences, and engineering technology. Graduate degrees were awarded in administration, American studies, humanities, education, engineering sciences, public administration, psychosocial science and regional planning.

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
