As the controversy increased during the '81 campaign, the Park's Undergraduate Student Government Elections Commissioner, Robert Fanning, said that Wimpy could not run because he did not have a full time status.

Undergraduate Student Government Supreme Court Justice, Gary Kazmer, said that Wimpy could be elected by writein votes but that his election could be disallowed because of his non-full time status.

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
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
