S.G.A. considers nuclear forum in draft resolution

Here is the complete text of the statement issued to the SGA senators this week.

We are distressed and dismayed by the recent rash of referenda on stockpiling of cyanide on various college campuses. We firmly believe that not all students are so fatalistic

as to prepare in such a way for nuclear armageddon. We understand that those promoting such stockpiling have as a major goal the raising of public consciousness, and we are in support of increasing awareness of this critical modern issue. However, we do not support suicide as a rational

or moral response. We would rather work from a more optimistic viewpoint with an eye toward reducing tension and promoting prevention of nuclear war.

Given our present knowledge of what would likely occur as a result of a strategic nuclear exchange, especially here in Central Pennsylvania with the many local strategic targets, we feel that the issue of stockpiling cyanide is moot. Moreover, the

very idea of suicide stands in direct opposition to generally accepted Western traditions of morality.

The question arises, "What are we to so if a nuclear war acoccurs?'' tually methodologies of survivability and competence of the general population come into play. If war comes, then, can we survive it? The preservation of life, not its voluntary cessation, is our prime concern.

Perhaps the most important question is that of prevention. Rather than planning for the coming of the Four Horsemen, we feel that negotiation and reduction of arenals is needed.

Thus, we propose as a first step that a forum be convened in the near future, here on our campus, to discuss these and related issues. The prime objective of this forum would be to look for positive approaches to seemingly intractable.




