

Bookstore opens after 5 - month delay

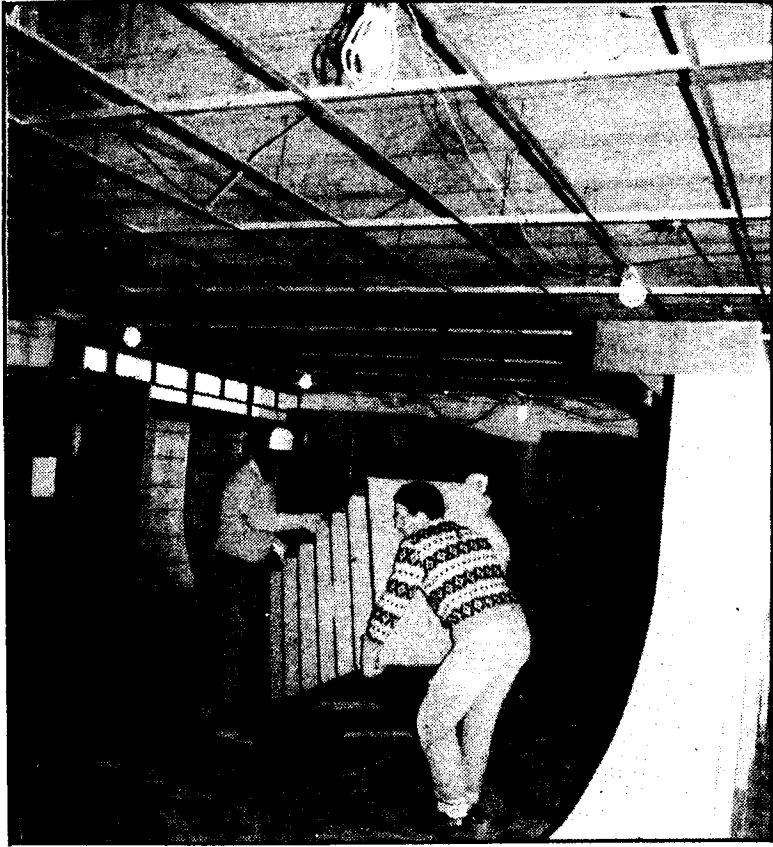
