91 students will have their parking sticker citations for parking without a sticker reduced from \$15 to \$0. Why? Well, according to Eugene Monahan, student court chief justice, there are basically three reasons for their dismissal.

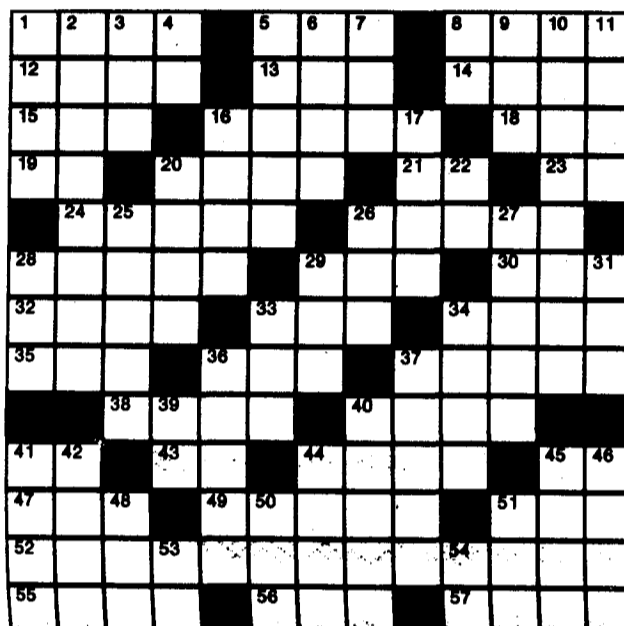
CROSS WORD PUZZLE
