EARTH DAY

Penn State Harrisburg will celebrate Earth Day 1990 with several events held throughout the week of April 16-22. All events are open to the community. The goal of Penn State Harrisburg--an active member of the Capital Region Earth Week Coalition--is to make the community aware of environmental conservation and recycling.

Events on campus held throughout the week include an outside sculpture display by Pennsylvania sculptors, a student art display, Earth Day t-shirt sales, an aluminum recycling contest, a compost display, environmental video presentations, a rain forest display, a recycling drive, an environmental workshop, and an Earth Day picnic with entertainment, tree planting, and sculpture building.

According to Andy Lau, Assistant Professor of Engineering and a coordinator of the Capital Region Earth Week Coalition, making the community aware of environmental conservation and recycling is the aim of Earth Day 1990 at Penn State Harrisburg.
