Claire is sweet and unassuming. She is also vulnerable because she has asthma. Sciorra genuinely convinces the audience, especially when she has an asthma attack right after Peyton emptied all of her inhalers.

Because of the director's excellent use of juxtaposition, the audience empathizes with Claire, when she realizes Peyton is the dead doctor's wife. Claire becomes suspicious and visits the doctor's house, which is for sale.

This conspiracy also prohibits you from selling most of your books at semester's end.


Last semester, I spent \$150 on books. In December, they took three of the 10 books back, and I left for Christmas break with \$15 and seven books I did not want to keep.
