Educational System, has been coordinating the logistics of each visit in union with the campus executive officers. She said the response to the tour from the campus community, and surrounding business leaders has been extremely positive.

As Pennsylvania's land grant institution, founded in 1855 and opened in 1859 as the Farmers High School, Penn State has been dedi-

cated to educational excellence ever since.

Penn State has conferred more than 400,000 degrees, and boasts the largest dues paying alumni association in the country, with more than 130,000 members.

Dr. Spanier wishes to promote a spirit of goodwill and cooperation through out Pennsylvania and is meeting with alumni, business and community leaders, parents, high school students, members

of the agricultural community, and faculty, administrators, staff and students at Penn State locations, to keep the educational lines of communication open to all.

Dr. Spanier has future plans for his outreach initiative program. Other components that are still being worked out include a legislative forum to discuss serious issues in higher education and listening sessions in communities around the state.

Bruhn also proposed to enhance the image of the college in a reach-out program and through better marketing in advertising. "We need to let people out there know who we are."

The new \$17 million library will be promoted along with Eastgate, the downtown Harrisburg school.

Bruhn spoke of the need for dual degree graduate programs - for instance, a masters in

Medical/Humanities. As medicine changes professionals need to learn more about a diversified field, he said.

Strengthening enrollment, attracting and obtaining better students with an Honors Program was on Bruhn's list. A board of directors is already discussing the plans. Dr. Glen Mazis will be in charge of the new program.

Faculty, staff and students voiced concern over the proposed changes.

They worried about how these alterations would affect their lives.

"We've e got to look at our future. We need to be pro-active and positive," Bruhn said.

Bruhn acknowledges that the Commonwealth Educational System plan is in the first draft stage.

Many unanswered questions remain; many issues need to be worked out. Time will tell.

"One of the things I want to do is sleep well at night," Bruhn said.

"There is no longer international business. It's just business," Blumberg said. "It is imperative that business students acquire the necessary knowledge and skills to manage today's complex global corporation."

There are no students in the program yet. According to Secretary Louise Smith, students will be encouraged to begin the International Business minor in the Fall semester.
