Baseball Playoff Spots Up for Grabs

With three starts left in the regular season, and a schedule including Detroit, Toronto, Chicago, and Baltimore, the Red Sox have the Wild Card wrapped up.


If Martinez can push the divisional series to five games, he will pitch twice against the Indians and they have a shot at going to the ALCS.
