On Feb. 2, the Penn State football team signed 29 players on National Signing day.

This first signing day of the new millennium was a great one for the Nittany Lions and should make most Lion fans happy after a disappointing 1999 season that saw the team finish 9-3 after winning their first nine straight

This class not only has quantity, but also some great quality and because of that, many recruiting analysts rate this group as not only one of the best classes in the Big Ten, but also in the entire nation.

In last year's somewhat dismal recruiting class, only 11 players were signed and the recruiting class did not even crack the top 20. This year's picks should make up for that.

The Lions signed four Parade All Americans, two from State College Area High School: place-kicker David Kimball and
