"Remember the Titans"

Remember the Titans is by far one of the most inspirational movies of the year. If there's one movie to see this fall, this is it.

The film is set in the early 1970s, when high school football was life to the residents of Alexandria, Virginia. At that time, public officials were forced to integrate schools and they hired a black man, Herman Boone (Denzel Washington), to be the coach of the local team. Bill Yoast (Will Patton), the more popularformer, coach, had to learn to coexist with Boone. Together, they shaped teenage boys into a team and taught them valuable lessons. Coaches Boone and Yoast healed a town torn by ignorance and prejudice through respect, determination and friendship.

Based on a true story, Remember the Titans is about driving young men toward discovery and bonding. It was written by Gregory Howard Allan and directed by Boaz Yakin (his debut).

The most notable scene in the movie occurs during a long training run that ends at the Gettysburg Battlefield. Coach Boone says, "Fifty thousand men died on the same field fighting the same battle we are still fighting today. If we too don't come together, we will be destroyed." Coach Boone emits intensity with fairness toward the players, the coaches and the community.

Remember the Titans is not your typical Jerry Bruckheimer production. His most popular productions include The Rock, Enemy of the State, Gone in Sixty Seconds and Armageddon, where there are explosions, car chases and hostage situations.

In Remember the Titans, Bruckheimer shows that a movie can be good without being an edge-of-your-seat thriller. They can be about exhilarating emotions of the human spirit. Remember the Titans achieves this goal with its cast, emotions and inspirations. In the long run, this film is, indeed, a winner.
